

Software

Depending on the company you are dealing with, they may use different applications or platforms to conduct their video interviews. In most cases, they will provide you with the necessary information and links in advance, specifying the software or platform you will need. If you are unsure about the specific application or platform required, don't hesitate to reach out to the company's contact person or the recruiter handling your application to clarify any doubts.

The most commonly used video software apps for interviews include Zoom, Microsoft Teams, Skype, Webex, Google Hangouts, and Cisco. These platforms offer various features such as video conferencing, screen sharing, and chat functions. Take the time to explore its features, settings, and interface, so you feel comfortable navigating through the platform during the interview.

Tip: To ensure a trouble-free experience, it is highly recommended to conduct some test-runs with a family member, friend, or even by yourself. This practice session will allow you to become familiar with the software's functionalities, test your audio and video settings, and identify any potential issues that may arise. During these test-runs, pay attention to aspects such as camera positioning, audio clarity, and general usability of the application.

Webcam

Most laptops come equipped with an integrated webcam, which is often sufficient for video interviews. However, it is essential to ensure that the application you are using has been granted access to

your webcam. Typically, a prompt will appear asking for permission to use the camera. In the event that your laptop does not have a built-in webcam or you are using a desktop PC, you will need to purchase an external webcam. It is crucial for recruiters to see your face during the interview, so having a functional webcam is a necessity.

Once you have your webcam ready, it is important to position it correctly. The interviewer should have a clear view of your entire head down to your shoulders. Avoid cutting off any parts of your face in the frame. Testing your webcam setup is essential here as well. If your laptop's camera is positioned too low and cuts off portions of your face, consider placing some books or a sturdy support under your laptop to elevate it to an appropriate height. Sitting hunched over your laptop throughout the interview can lead to discomfort or strain on your neck, so it's crucial to ensure a comfortable setup.

Tip: Avoid using phones and tablets for video interviews whenever possible. The microphone quality on these devices tends to be weaker compared to laptops or external webcams, potentially affecting the clarity of your audio. Additionally, the smaller screen size of phones and tablets may not provide an optimal output for your interviewer's computer, potentially hindering the visual experience. Using your phone for interviews may result in frequent notifications popping up, leading to distractions that can divert your focus from the interview objectives. For the best possible interview experience, we highly recommended using a laptop or desktop computer with a reliable webcam setup.





Audio

When it comes to audio for your video interview, most laptops are equipped with built-in microphones that are generally of decent quality. However, it is important to be mindful of certain factors that can impact audio clarity. The built-in microphone can pick up sounds when you move or shift in your chair, leading to distractions for the interviewer. To ensure optimal audio quality, it is advisable to minimise erratic movements and be aware of potential background noise if you plan to use the built-in microphone.

An alternative option is to use a headset with a microphone. Investing in a good-quality headset can significantly enhance your audio experience during the interview. Look for headsets that feature mufflers or noise-cancelling technology on the microphone, as these can effectively eliminate background noise and provide clear sound transmission (yes you can you can use your gaming headset!). Using a headset not only ensures better audio quality but also reduces the risk of unexpected noise disturbances that may arise in your environment.

Video Background

Contrary to the recommendation of some companies, we believe that your video background should reflect your personality rather than being fully clear or completely blurred. Since you are in your home environment, it is an opportunity to showcase a bit of your personal style and interests. While it is important to maintain cleanliness and avoid a cluttered or messy background, there is no need to hide your personality entirely after all it could be what bags you that dream job!

In our experience conducting numerous interviews over the past year, we have come across some truly fascinating backgrounds. Candidates have displayed bookshelves filled with an array of interesting reads, framed sports jerseys representing their passion, captivating portraits, and even their own creative artwork. These unique backgrounds have often served as conversation starters, with interviewers expressing genuine interest in the items or decor behind the candidate. It can be an easy icebreaker that helps establish rapport and create a more relaxed atmosphere for the interview.

Tip: During your video interview, it is a good idea to have a glass of water within reach. Even the most confident individuals can experience dry mouths when speaking for an extended period. Having water on hand allows you to stay hydrated and alleviate any potential discomfort or hoarseness in your voice. Remember to take sips of water during natural pauses or breaks in the conversation, ensuring that your voice remains clear, and you can maintain your focus throughout the interview.

Tip: Regardless of whether you use the built-in microphone or a headset, test your audio setup before the interview. Use the video conferencing software or application you will be using for the interview to conduct a trial run with a friend or family member. This allows you to gauge the audio quality and make any necessary adjustments to your microphone settings or positioning.

Lighting






Environment

Tip: Silence your phone. Before the interview begins, ensure that your mobile phone is on silent mode or turned off completely. Incoming notifications, calls, or messages can disrupt your concentration and divert your attention from the interview. Video Interview Checklist

If things go wrong

If your video or audio stops working

If you encounter issues with your video or audio during the interview, calmly explain the situation to the interviewer and ask if you can continue the interview by phone or if it would be possible to reschedule.

Having the option to switch to a phone call can help ensure that the interview can still proceed smoothly, even if there are technical glitches.




If someone enters the room unexpectedly

In the event that a family member, housemate, or even a pet enters the room during your interview, maintain composure and simply apologise to the interviewer for the interruption. Ask for a brief pause or a few seconds to address the situation. This gives you an opportunity to turn off your microphone and camera temporarily, preventing any distractions caused by the unexpected visitor.

Once the interruption has been handled and you are confident that there will be no further disturbances, you can turn your camera and microphone back on and resume the interview.

Remember that recruiters are accustomed to interruptions during video interviews, given that they are conducted from candidates' homes. They understand that these interruptions are a normal part of life and should not be a cause for excessive concern.

The key in handling any unexpected situations during a video interview is to remain calm, communicate clearly with the interviewer, and take the necessary steps to address the issue promptly. 
Hand Gestures




